I am passing along a call for assistance from Dr. Shana L. Stuart with University of Iowa. Dr. Stuart runs a project that focuses on the history of all the Carnegie libraries in Iowa. It's called Carnegie Libraries in Iowa Project (CLIP). Dr. Stuart is seeking some short biographies for the founders of the libraries. In particular, Dr. Stuart is hoping these biographies might reveal some interesting relationships, and that is why she approached IGS.

Dr. Stuart has already received biographies of the trustees from a few towns. In one of the towns, it was revealed that all of the members of the first board of trustees were related by marriage. They were all brothers-in-law. Similarly, I noticed that one of the trustees in Fort Dodge was a Carpenter, and so was the first librarian. Whether they were kin is the kind of information that Dr. Stuart hopes to reveal.

Meanwhile, I had the opportunity to show my dad around the IGS library a while back. Being here in the East Village of Des Moines reminded him of his aunt who lived nearby at one time. The memories were part happy and part sad. I am not sure what brought Aunt Bertie and Uncle Lawrence to Des Moines or for how long they stayed. Aunt Bertie and Uncle Lawrence lived in the Webster County town of Clare later in life. They had family in nearby Fort Dodge and Gilmore City. One cold winter night after visiting a neighboring town, they were caught out in a storm. They were headed back to Clare, and they were about one mile from home when their car got stuck. They must have thought they could make it home on foot so they started out walking. Aunt Bertie didn't make it. Uncle Lawrence was taken to the hospital. He received treatment for exposure, but he died too. I recount this story as a precautionary tale. My sincere wish for everybody this Winter is that you stay warm and safe. Happy Holidays!

HIGHLIGHTED COLLECTION

We at IGS hope you had a great Thanksgiving. Thanksgiving is a wonderful time of the year. It gives us an opportunity to step back from our busy lives, and reflect on the things for which we have to be thankful. Hopefully that includes your family. Spending time with loved ones is one of the happiest parts of the holiday. Perhaps that is why it is also the busiest time of the year for travel. Thanksgiving is also alternatively known as National Family History Day. That is because having all of your family members together is the perfect time to share what you have discovered about your family. Thanksgiving may be over, but the Holiday Season is just getting going, and there will be more times to gather with your family. Here is a list of resources you can use to guide those discussions this season.

DNA

All of the major DNA companies offer discounts on testing products this season. Perhaps you purchased a kit on Black Friday or are gifted one this Christmas. Make testing a family occasion - especially if more than one of you received a kit. If you have already sent your sample, then consider getting the family together to share your results. Sorting through your match list can be an engrossing family activity.

- [DNA and Genealogy](#) by Colleen Fitzpatrick, Ph.D. and Andrew Yeiser (ISBN: 0976716011). This book discusses several topics surrounding DNA and genealogical research. First, it discusses the basics of DNA including autosomal DNA, mitochondrial DNA, and the human genome. Then it goes more in depth to discuss the options for genetic testing, and the companies that offer them. Unfortunately, this book is from 2005 so the tests these companies offer are probably different. It also discusses next steps once you get your test results. There is a chapter about working with your DNA cousins to triangulate your most recent common ancestor. There is a chapter about surname studies. There is even a chapter about nonpaternity events - an uncomfortable, but sometimes necessary discussion with the family. Available at IGS and Amazon Smile.
- [DNA and Family History](#) by Chris Pomery (ISBN: 1903365708). This book is similar to the previous one in this list. Like Fitzpatrick, Pomery discussed what parts of your lineage are encoded in DNA, the major companies, and their offerings, and how to interpret your results. Pomery specializes in one-name studies, and so that is an area on which he provides more information. However, while some texts on genetic genealogy can be too technical for the average hobbyist, Pomery discusses the topic using simple language aimed at the non-scientist. - [Trace Your Roots with DNA](#) by Megan Smolenyak Smolenyak and Ann Turner (ISBN: 1594860068)

If none of these suit you, consider joining IGS' DNA special interest group. It meets the first Tuesday of every month using Zoom.

Documenting your Family's Oral History

One way to get younger people interested in the family history is to gather up all of your children, grandchildren, and anyone else who wants to listen, and tell them the stories. While you're doing that, you might as well record it. These books can help you make a strategy for getting your story on the record.

- [Recording your Family History](#) by William Fletcher (ISBN: 0396088872). This book is a little old (first published in 1983 under a different title) but it is still a great reference for how to record your family history. It is actually written as a guide for conducting interviews with an elder relative as the subject giving their autobiographical life story. Fletcher provides lists of suggested topics and questions to help bring out pieces of information from different periods in your relative's life. He also provides questions that might put your relative's life in context. Here's where the book's age is a bit of a hindrance, but not one that cannot be overcome. Questions such as "Do you remember the turn of the century - New Year's 1900?" can easily be adapted for current times. Your grandchildren might enjoy hearing how you brought in the new millennium. Another chapter provides questions to ask about your relative's unusual life experiences, and their personal philosophy and values. Finally, the book has special questions to ask if your relative is Jewish, African-American, or Latino. Available at IGS and Amazon Smile.
- [How to Tape Instant Oral Biographies](#) by Bill Zimmerman (ISBN: 1558705260). This book is similar to the previous book in that it gives strategies for recording one's story. One special part of this book discusses using the interview as an opportunity for the interviewer and interviewee to collaborate in making a time capsule to preserve your hopes and dreams. This can be a family activity - perhaps one that your family will remember and cherish for all their years. Finally, Zimmerman acknowledges that families look a lot different nowadays than they did in the past. He discusses interviewing members of families who may be multiracial, multiethnic, or multireligious, parts of blended families, and members of families that are headed by single parents, grandparents, two moms, two dads, etc. Available at IGS and Amazon Smile.

Medical History

While you're sharing your family history, don't leave out medical history. There is a lot that your genealogical research can reveal about your family's medical and behavioral history. Note: these books were written before DNA testing such as that from 23andMe became available. They do not discuss DNA test results. Instead, they discuss predicting whether someone is likely to be a carrier of a gene that could cause a medical condition.

- [How Healthy is Your Family Tree?](#) by Carol Krause (ISBN: 0020441657). If you're reading this, you probably have a family tree. That's step one of documenting your medical history. Step two involves gathering all of the medical information you can. Documentary evidence is important, but conversations with family members are too. Krause guides you to know which types of information are important. Step three is charting that information on your family tree. The book goes on to discuss interpreting what you find out. Behavioral conditions (e.g. alcoholism, mental illness, etc.) are charted too. Available at IGS and Amazon Smile.
- [Genetic Connections](#) by Danette L. Nelson-Anderson and Cynthia V. Waters (ISBN: 0963915436). This book is a type of medical text. It discusses each of the body's organ systems with explanation of a number of possibly hereditary medical conditions. Available at IGS.
- [My Family Health Portrait](#) by U.S. Surgeon General. If you are not able to come to IGS, you can use this program to chart your medical family history. Note, the program is online, but you keep the data.

Our vision is to use the group to do actual research using the library resources and online beyond Ancestry. These groups are hands-on; your input directs the discussions. If you have questions or need help, you have immediate access to someone.

Would you please come to our informal meeting to help set up how the two groups will operate? Your input is needed to help shape these two groups. We expect them both to have a handful of people to start. As one or both groups grow, we will reevaluate to see if they need to be separated. The anticipation is that the African American researchers will be beginning researchers, but all beginning researchers start the same way, regardless of nationality.

Discuss a resource at the beginning of the meetings, followed by a question and answer period about the resource. (5-10 minutes)
